Parks & Recreation County-wide Master Plan

Gives guidance and focus for long-range planning

- Total acreage and distribution of park land
- Identifies the need for and distribution of parks
- Regional trails and local trail connections
- Open space acquisition and management
- Recreation centers, swimming pools, ice sheets, etc.
- Park amenities like tennis, baseball, volleyball etc.
- Sports and recreational programming
- Includes park and facility inventories
- Examines trends and forecasts needs
- Establishes park and recreation standards and needs
- Generally has a shelf life of +/- ten years
- Last updated and adopted by Mayor and County Council in September 2015.








2010 Planning Area Demographics






Q21 Actions Priority Levels




Priority Actions for Salt Lake County Parks and Recreation-2017


2012 vs. 2017 Comparison






Recreation Centers overlaid with subdivisions with 3 mile service radius.




Recreation Centers overlaid with regional parks with 3 mile service radius.




Class One Regional Parks with 3 mile service radius.




Indoor Swimming Pools with 3 mile service radius.




Outdoor Swimming Pool with 3 mile service radius.




Golf Courses with 3 mile service radius.




Ice Centers with 3 mile service radius.




Estimated drive time to Recreation Centers at 6:00 pm.



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NRPA states on average 10.1 acres of park land per 1,000 residents.

Salt Lake County standard adopted in 2015 5 acres per 1,000 residents.

Even at that lower quartile we are still behind 902 acres and estimate to be over 2400 acres behind national average by 2030.


