



Mayor Wilson's Message

Hello Salt Lake County!

This winter has been one for the books—literally! Can you believe the weather we've had? Our snowpack is officially the highest it's been at this time of year in more than 40 years. While we desperately need this year's moisture to help with drought conditions, this moisture now presents an additional problem: potential flooding.

There is currently a lot of snowpack in the mountains. When rain is piled on top of this snow, it can cause something called sheet flooding because the ground is still too frozen to absorb the additional water. Additionally, there is the potential for flooding throughout this season due to spring runoff.

To stay prepared for potential flooding and to stay safe throughout the season, Emergency Management recommends the following:

- Inspect your rain gutters and downspouts and confirm that they are clear of snow and debris.
- Ensure the storm drains closest to your home and the area around them are clear of any debris.
- Pay attention to your landscaping, making sure water drains away from your home.
- Keep children and pets away from potential flood and drainage areas.
- Watch out for surface runoff and shallow sheet flooding from snow-covered open areas and driveways that may slope toward your home.

Active Threat Training

Together we all work to make Salt Lake County a safe place to work and to live. Unfortunately, acts of violence can occur even in the safest of places. One thing we can do to make our County safer is to learn about how to respond to threats, such as active shooters.

At the Mayor's request, the County Council approved a series of active threat training courses designed specifically for Salt Lake County Government employees. Coordinated by Salt Lake County Emergency Management and the Public Safety Bureau, these optional two-hour awareness-level active threat training courses will be offered on **March 29**, **30**, **and 31**, **2023**, at seven different locations across the County. This course will involve a presentation by experts, followed by a live simulation that may include the safe and controlled firing of weapons.

New ePortal

Streamline & Simplify Your Work with ePortal!

Salt Lake County is rolling out a new portal for employees (and other agencies on our network) to streamline and simplify work in the months ahead. Thanks to the roughly 150 employees who voted earlier this month to help name this new tool. This portal, now called ePortal, will eventually provide secure, convenient access to many of the applications you use (Office 365, Saba, Peoplesoft).

 to this project.
- Later this year, ePortal will replace Fortitoken Mobile. However, until this
 process is complete do NOT delete the Foritoken Mobile Application for
 Multifactor Authentication (MFA).
