Salt Lake County Housing & Community Development (HCD) hosted three events in September 2022 to learn about the needs of low and moderate-income people in Salt Lake County. This is the first stage of the annual process to develop and implement the Annual Action Plan for Program year 2023-2024. Activities that will be included in the Annual Action Plan will be facilitated by federal grants which are administered by Salt Lake County, including CDBG, ESG and HOME funding through the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development, and SSBG funds from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) which are passed through the State of Utah.

Following is a summary of the input that was received across all three events. This information has been used to inform the priorities and structure of the Requests for Applications (RFA's) for the 2023 Program Year (July 2023 – June 2024).

Category: Consideration
(County will consider comments for future decisions or RFA's)
2019 priorities still high
Funders should connect partners to other partners
Hard cost projects consideration - lowest bid vs "lowest reasonable bid"
Harm reduction needs to be considered
Housing is healthcare. Approach holistically
Importance of street outreach
Lot of needs, but housing is still highest
Mental health does not get prioritized
Need more therapists, legal assistance
Need to build trust between agencies and County so that hard conversations can be held
Need to look at AMI & Income Level (HUD requirements)
Need to move from "Housing First" to "Housing Plus"
Program maintenance needs to be considered (implications of current programs not being funded)
Providers having to do more with less. County should acknowledge changing needs of organizations.
Staff burnout, recruitment, retention. Need funds for admin and salaries
Staffing issues can impact an organization's ability to manage funds
Substance abuse, domestic violence clients - losing housing as COVID subsidies and protections are lost
There are a lot of people one paycheck away from losing housing & healthcare
We have different opinions based on agency size, etc.
ZoomGrants is difficult to use
Extensive wait time for mental and behavioral health (e.g. 7 months)
Different pressures on housing (raising rents, month-to-month leases, etc.)
Category: Process

Would like to see some level of blind review, so committee does not bring personal knowledge or bias to all areas of scoring

Is there a way to do a "blind review"? Feel there is bias towards larger agencies. Somehow show goals and impact if there is a way to overview prior to review. Challenge assumptions.

Category: Training

(County will add to agenda or materials for training sessions)

Applicants would like more info on review process to better write to the readers

Asked for training on how to get to those sources. Timing.

Concern about how data is being used

How are apps reviewed? Applicants want to understand

Is capacity & partnerships measuring the same thing?

Is it HUD goals or local goals that are prioritized?

Some wanted to see roster - where is money available from other places?

Category: RFA

(County will consider for integration with RFA's)

Add diversity, equity, inclusion

Combine goals & impact/outcomes

Cost per service is a hard metric to compare apples to apples

Define sustainability - financial

Demonstrated need?

Do NOT like sustainability question. Rename? What differentiates "weaning" question

Include challenges in overview so that reader understands the context

Innovation - how are agencies preventing burnout and supporting staff who are low-income themselves?

Need to better train on how to calculate cost of service

Questions are redundant

Review prior question scoring - if historically all agencies score high, not a helpful question. Consider omitting. Service accessibility?

Suggestion - "How has your organization had to adapt" to educate County on changes from prior years, and demonstrate capacity

Supported knowledge that agencies that have been able to sustain for quite a few years.

Sustainability of staff – lower cost

There is a lot of need, we need to define how these fit into bigger ecosystems

Tying in innovation. What is being done to make a bigger impact.

What would create a bigger impact. (Try new things, learn from, adapt)

Would like to see Diversion, Equity, Inclusion added to application criteria

Prioritize partnerships - allow each partner to do what they do best to leverage each other's strengths

Category: Scoring

(County will consider for scoring criteria and weighting)

Beneficiaries + project weighting, measuring same thing?

Budget should be weighted more

Combine impact & outcomes - hard to measure outcomes. Would like to see more measuring of outputs

which are measurable

Do application overview and project overview need to be scored?

Don't punish new organizations in scoring

For follow-up, allow respondents to give anonymous input on weighting suggestions

Impact should be weighed the most

Input that project beneficiaries should be ranked higher

Look at scoring to make sure there is a large enough differentiation (are all high?)

Programming & Outcomes should be weighted more

Rank beneficiaries higher in scoring

Reduce weight of application overview

Score innovation

Weight experience higher - how can accreditation be factored in?

Weight populations served higher

Don't like scoring of the budget. "Weird". Possibly yay or nay or pass or fail, or combine with sustainability Admin and committee scorecards should be more similar, so that context is not missed

ECONOMIC MOBILITY

GOAL: IMPROVE EMPLOYMENT AND ACHIEVE MOBILITY TO TRANSITION OUT OF SUBSIDIES

Funds: CDBG-CV, SSBG, CDBG

Must serve one of the following populations to receive full points for beneficiaries served: 55+, DV Survivors, families, unsheltered families, immigrant & refugees, medically frail homeless, severely rent burdened, homeless youth, long-term disability.

ECONOMIC STABILITY GOAL: STABILIZE LONG TERM WITH SUBSIDIES

Funds: HOME ARP, ESG, SSBG, CDBG

Must serve 55+ or disabled to get full points for project beneficiaries served. Disabled includes chronic homeless.
